Background

1. On 19 June 2023, [REDACTED] (“the **Data Subject**”) lodged a complaint pursuant to Article 77 GDPR with the Data Protection Commission (“the **DPC**”) concerning Meta Platforms Ireland Limited (“the **Respondent**”).
2. The DPC was deemed to be the competent authority for the purpose of Article 56(1) GDPR.

The Complaint

3. The details of the complaint were as follows:
 - a. The Data Subject submitted an access request to the Respondent after noting their previously user-deleted Facebook account was still visible on the platform. The Data Subject attempted to log into the account after being notified that one of their business pages was still visible on the platform, but noted it was disabled. The Data Subject also noted that the name on their personal page had been changed to a different name.
 - b. The Data Subject received a response from the Respondent to login to their account to use the self-service tool, which they were unable to do as their account was disabled. Accordingly, the Data Subject subsequently lodged a complaint with the DPC.

Action taken by the DPC

4. The DPC, pursuant to Section 109(4) of the Data Protection Act, 2018 (“the **2018 Act**”), is required, as a preliminary matter, to assess the likelihood of the parties to the complaint reaching, within a reasonable time, an amicable resolution of the subject-matter of the complaint. Where the DPC considers that there is a reasonable likelihood of such an amicable resolution being concluded between the parties, it is empowered, by Section 109(2) of the 2018 Act, to take such steps as it considers appropriate to arrange or facilitate such an amicable resolution.
5. Following a preliminary examination of the material referred to it by the Data Subject, the DPC considered that there was a reasonable likelihood of the parties concerned reaching, within a reasonable time, an amicable resolution of the subject matter of the complaint. The DPC’s experience is that complaints of this nature are particularly suitable for amicable resolution in circumstances where there is an obvious solution to the dispute, if the respondent is willing to engage in the process. In this regard, the DPC had regard to:
 - a. The relationship between the Data Subject and Respondent (being, in this case, an individual consumer and a service provider); and
 - b. The nature of the complaint (in this case, an unsuccessful attempt by the Data Subject to exercise their data subject rights).

6. While not relevant to the assessment that the DPC is required to carry out pursuant to Section 109(4) of the 2018 Act, the DPC also had regard to EDPB Guidelines 06/2022 on the practical implementation of amicable settlements Version 2.0, adopted on 12 May 2022 (“**Document 06/2022**”), and considered that:
 - a. the possible conclusion of the complaint by way of amicable resolution would not hamper the ability of the supervisory authorities to maintain the high level of protection that the GDPR seeks to create; and that
 - b. such a conclusion, in this case, would likely carry advantages for the Data Subject, whose rights under the GDPR would be vindicated swiftly, as well as for the controller, who would be provided the opportunity to bring its behaviour into compliance with the GDPR.

Amicable Resolution

7. The DPC engaged with both the Data Subject and Respondent in relation to the subject matter of the complaint. In its response to the DPC, the Respondent explained that it had no records of the Facebook account having been previously deleted by the Data Subject, and confirmed the page was created at a later date than the Data Subject had mentioned, using a pseudonym, which the Respondent noted was in violation of its terms and polices. The Respondent advised that as the Facebook account was still active, the Data Subject should use the self-service tool to access their data to verify ownership of the account.
8. Following further engagement between the Data Subject and the Respondent, the Respondent was able to identify the primary Facebook account details, as well as the advertisement accounts associated with it. The Respondent confirmed this page matched the details provided by the Data Subject, but had not been previously deleted or deactivated by the Data Subject.
9. The Respondent required a new secure e-mail address to facilitate the Data Subject regaining access to the account, as part of its verification process. The DPC continued to engage with the Data Subject and the Respondent facilitating the exchange of the preferred e-mail address. The Data Subject was then able to delete the associated advertisement accounts, as well as their Facebook page.
10. In light of the explanations provided by the Respondent, as set out above, the requested Facebook pages having now been permanently deleted, the dispute between the Data Subject and Respondent appeared to have been resolved. In the circumstances, the DPC asked the Data Subject to notify it, within a specified timeframe, if they were not satisfied with the outcome, so that the DPC could take further action. The DPC did not receive any further communication from the Data Subject and, accordingly, the complaint has been deemed to have been amicably resolved.

11. In circumstances where the subject matter of the complaint has been amicably resolved, in full, the complaint, by virtue of Section 109(3) of the 2018 Act, is deemed to have been withdrawn by the Data Subject.

Confirmation of Outcome

12. For the purpose of Document 06/2022, the DPC confirms that:

- a. The complaint, in its entirety, has been amicably resolved between the parties concerned;
- b. The agreed resolution is such that the object of the complaint no longer exists; and
- c. Having consulted with the supervisory authorities concerned on the information set out above, as required by Document 06/2022 the DPC has now closed off its file in this matter.

13. If dissatisfied with the outcome recorded herein, the parties have the right to an effective remedy by way of an application for judicial review, by the Irish High Court, of the process applied by the DPC in the context of the within complaint.
